### How do I reach out to the media?

• Call or email. Most of us prefer email.

### How?

- Go to each TV station's website.
- Look for a button that says "Contact us." There's likely a form you can fill out.
- Or look for a phone number. (You likely will have to go to the bottom of their website to find a phone number.)

### What do I say?

- When they answer, ask for the newsroom.
- When the newsroom answers, simply say, "What's the best email address for a news release?"
- Try to avoid calling between 8:30a.m.-10:30a.m. & 2p.m.-3p.m. when many newsrooms are in meetings.

### How do I do a news release?

- Make it simple include the basic details like who, what, when, why, and how. Consider creating a catching subject line/headline. Make sure the date is high up, because many recipients won't read very far down the email.
- There are lots of ways to do this, I have included a few below.

If you want some help, you can actually send an email that says:

Wednesday is Walk & Roll to School Day!

When: Wednesday, Nov. 8. The best time is 7:30a.m.-7:45a.m., but arrivals run from 7:15a.m.-8:00a.m. Let us know if you need a spokesperson there earlier or later!

Where: Kids, parents and teachers will be at 8<sup>th</sup> and Main at Johnson Elementary

Why: To encourage kids to walk, bike, board, etc to school.

Safety: Please ask your morning news anchors to talk about the increased need to be vigilant today because there will be more parents and kids around schools.

You're invited: We'd love to host your crew at the school. Teachers can talk about how kids who walk to school are more ready to learn, more focused, and more connected to their classmates. You can talk to parents and kids about why they walked/biked to school today.

Interesting facts:

- Only 11% of kids bike and walk to school. In the 1960's, that number was 50%
- Walking or biking just a few minutes before school increases attention span (and whatever fun facts you have)
