About the Buffalo Public School

- 57 Schools 38 Pre K thru 8 buildings.
- 74% free or reduced lunch.
- Ethnic background: 50% African American, 22% Caucasian, 17% Hispanic, 19% Limited English Proficient, culturally diverse with a large refugee population.
- State Education Department Accountability Status: 47% Priority, 29% Focus, 24% Good Standing.
- Interim Superintendent 3rd Superintendent in 4 yrs.
 School Board has new leadership and membership.
- 86.5% ride the bus to school.
- Choice district lottery placements.



Attendance Improvement Initiatives

- 1.) Data conversion 2011
- 2.) Integration of attendance with PBIS (RtI– B)
- 3.) Updated the attendance teacher job description
- 4.) High School Student Ambassadors Get Schooled
- (# 1 Nationally and 10 schools in the top 35 spots)
- 5.) Ready Freddy Pre K and K
- 6.) GE Attendance Workout



BPS Student Eligibility:

a.) Students attending schools more than 1 and $\frac{1}{2}$ miles and less than fifteen miles walking distance from their home.

b.) Students eligible for McKinney-Vento.

c.) Students with disabilities.

d.) Transportation pass on public buses or trains operated by the Niagara Frontier Transportation Authority (NFTA), good for passage to and from schools for students enrolled in grades nine through twelve.



Transportation Attendance Barrier

- Transportation was reported as the 2nd largest barrier to school attendance (Youth Risk Behavior Survey).
- Focus group data taught us that:
 - Full (or not so full) NFTA busses drove past students
 - Lost/stolen bus passes can only be replace by going to the transportation office, 1–2 weeks
- Behavior: Data suggested a high number of NFTA passes were being confiscated.



(GE) Attendance Workout Procession

Consultants worked with a cross section of professionals with the goal of turning around transportation barriers to attendance in 100 days. Teams got together for 2 "design sessions" and concluded the planning with immediate Superintendent approval to move forward. Committees included:

- Transportation
- Attendance
 - Registration Process
 - Communication Strategy
 - Attendance Data
 - School Climate



Work-out Finding #1



Finding 1: NFTA Student Passes were being confiscated (concentrating on specific bus routes/officers).

Goal 1: To reduce the monthly average number of confiscated passes by 25% in 100 days.

Actions:

- Confiscated passes were returned to building where school staff discussed the incidents with students.
- Increase monitoring of routes/officer confiscations





Finding #2: Pass replacements were issued at one location in the City and the process took up to 2 weeks.

Goal #2: Shorten pass replacement time and be more responsive to the student/family consumer.

Action #2: Pilot a replacement process at school building and eliminate the need for travel to terminal.







- Data clarified the actual number of pass confiscations and found that most are due to being off-route or using the pass after time is expired.
- Additional training for NFTA staff is necessary to further reduce unnecessary confiscations.
- Pass restrictions need to be examined in order to determine best practices for our student body and the District
 - Routing
 - Valid pass hours



Other Transportation Barrier Not Yet Addressed



After the new year, for NFTA busses not picking up students, we will work with our Student Ambassadors to:

- Develop a data reporting logging system for students to report times they are not picked up.
- Have students lead a town meeting with City Council and other elected officials and representatives to address issue with the NFTA.
